## HIGH SUGAR CONTENT FOOD AND DRINKS

We have seen a significant rise in students bringing food and drink with high sugar contents into the academy. This includes gelatine sweets that are covered in sugar and energy drinks such as Lucozade and Red Bull. Students should avoid bringing high-sugar content food and drinks to school for several key reasons:

### 1. Negative Impact on Concentration and Learning

Consuming high-sugar snacks and drinks can lead to rapid spikes in blood sugar levels, followed by crashes. This cycle often causes fatigue, difficulty concentrating, and irritability, all of which can hinder students' ability to focus and learn effectively in class.

### 2. Risk of Long-Term Health Issues

Regular consumption of sugary foods and drinks can increase the risk of developing health problems like obesity, type 2 diabetes, and dental issues such as cavities.

### 3. Disrupts Energy Levels

Sugar provides a quick burst of energy but leads to an energy crash soon after. This fluctuation can make students feel sluggish or tired during important lessons or activities, reducing their productivity and participation.

### 4. Promotes Unhealthy Eating Habits

Allowing students to bring high-sugar items can normalize unhealthy eating behaviours, reinforcing poor dietary choices.

#### 5. Potential Behavioural Problems

Studies have shown a correlation between excessive sugar intake and hyperactivity or mood swings in children.

### 6. Peer Pressure and Inequality

When students bring sugary treats to school, it can create pressure on their peers to do the same, leading to an unhealthy culture of snacking on junk food.

We have no issues with students bringing a small snack for break and lunch. If you have any concerns please speak to your child's Head of year.

### **Allergens**

From September, our trust will no longer serve any products to students that contain or may contain nuts. As most school classrooms have at least one child with a nut allergy, this decision has been made to ensure the safety of all of our students.

As such, if your child brings in a packed lunch to school, please ensure that it contains no traces of nuts. The health and safety policy has been updated with further information and is available to view on the policies section of our Trust website, but should you require any additional information, please contact the main school office.

## **OPEN EVENING**

On Thursday 26 September we hosted our Year 6 Open Evening. This is an annual event that introduces the Academy to our next potential cohort of students. The evening allows Parents to gain valuable insights into the school's curriculum, values, and approach to education.

Despite the atrocious weather we had a record number of parents attend and the atmosphere was fantastic.

We predict that we will easily achieve our pupil allocation number next year based on the volume of parents placing Dixons Croxteth as first preference.

- We are 'Team Croxteth' an important part of the community of North Liverpool. We are proud to work here, and students and parents are proud to be part of our community




# MY CHILD AT SCHOOL (MCAS) APP


One of our aims at Dixons Croxteth is to strengthen our Parent-School Relationship. We launched the newsletter last year and have further developed this with the video blog.

Our next big change will be the introduction of the My Child At School App (MCAS). Over the next few months, we will be rolling out MCAS as the method of communication between parents and families.

My Child at School (MCAS) is a portal which enables parents and carers to view their child's academic performance in real-time, via a web browser or mobile app. The type of information provided in the app include assessment, attendance, behaviour, pupil details, communication, consent forms, timetables, annual reports, exam details and Using the app also allows us to reduce the need to use paper and the cost of SMS messages.

More information will follow about the role out of this over the coming weeks with the aim of all families using the app by Easter 2025.

### **Paired Reading**

The paired reading group at Dixons Croxteth, develops reading across the key stages and allows students to confidently interact with texts. Year 11 students are paired with a student from Year 8 or Year 9 and they mentor and inspire the younger readers whilst developing reading fluency and accuracy.

### The programme runs every Monday morning from 8.15am in the Library. Miss Gregson said:

"It is engaging program which fosters a love for literature alongside building confidence and friendship across the key stages. Each session, students will explore captivating stories together, discussing themes, characters, and ideas that resonate. With the guidance of their older peers, younger students will enhance their reading skills and discover new perspectives, while Year 11s develop leadership abilities and a passion for helping others".
